Executive Summary

It is our profound privilege to enumerate the brief history of the establishment of our institution. Shree Yoganand Swami Arts College, is established in the year 1997 under the umbrella of Jai Bhavani Shikshan Prasarak Mandal at Basmath. Our Founder President, Dr. Jayprakashji S. Mundada Ex.Co-operative Minister, State of Maharashtra and Member of Legislative Assembly (MLA) who is great social reformist nurtured the institute from the very beginning. Approximately 35-40 percent population of Basmat and surrounding villages is tribal ,other backward class communities like padmashali, khatri, dhangar, teli, koli, mali and Schedule caste and who are out of stream of education channel. Therefore our founder President's vision was to provide quality education to students from diverse backgrounds, irrespective of region, religion, caste, economic strata and academic performance. The institution is located in Basmath town where 95 percent students are from rural area.

It is a grant-in-aid institution affiliated to S.R.T.M.U. Nanded and is recognized by the University Grants Commission under section 2 (F) and 12 (B). It offers a wide range of courses at UG level where Medium of instruction is Marathi. This college is also runs a center of Y.C.M.O.U. Nashik and offers several subjects in distance education like B.A., B.COM. and preparatory.

The college has single granted faculty i.e. Faculty of Arts with 11 different departments. College also provides Home Science subject specially for girls and Geography as a practical oriented courses. The motto to start Home science course is empowerment of girls by providing students quality education with skills and values creating responsible citizens which directly help them for self sufficiency and economic independence. There are 22 teaching staff out of whom 05 are female. Nine(9) faculties are Ph.D. holder however 13 are registered for Ph.D. There are 8 non teaching staff members in the college.

The college has a central library, indoor, outdoor Sports facilities, Canteen, and cells like girls grievance, grievance redressal, Anti ragging, Right to information, Nutrition, Family Child Counseling with Girl's Common room to ensure gender & social equality & provide help, support & guidance to students whenever required. Through all these programmes, the college aims at all round personality development of the students to meet global challenges.

Earn while learn scheme is innovative concept activated in college. This Scheme was started to help poor and needy students where can work after college hours for campus development and in library. Each staff of this College create funds by monthly salary deduction of Rs. 500/- for principal, Rs.200/- for teaching staff and Rs.100/- for non teaching staff where the regular and needy students are assist to remit their examination fees, pay for bus passes and help them to take higher education without any obstacle. Staff is devoted towards the stakeholders of the region. Initiative has been taken by this college management to start archery game which is included at University level. Apart from this error free writing skills in marahti language has also been started. As per the changing trends and necessities of society the importance of health and Nutrition of family and welfare of children ,family is at high importance. By keeping this in mind department of Home Science started nutrition counseling and child ,family welfare counseling.

Transparency is being maintained in the admission process on first come first basis following University rules & reservation policy. Academic calendar & teaching plans are prepared at the beginning of the academic year well in advance. In addition to the regular lecture method, teaching- learning process is enriched through interactive sessions, projects, ample use of audio visuals & modern techniques like use of LCD projector. The student's progress is monitored through regular unit tests, preliminary examinations and practice examination etc. Special coaching is provided to identified weak students & Feedback about teaching—learning process is also obtained for the further improvement from the students as well as seniors.

N.S.S unit of 100 students is sanctioned to this college. The college is having only one single faculty . i.e. Faculty of Arts . Yet Post graduation courses are not started in the college. No Research Facilities and laboratories are available in the college Hence students have to move to other colleges for higher education.

Opportunities

The institute has career counseling & guidance cell. The function of the cell is to give guidance about the employability and job opportunities. The college organizes the guest lecturers for the students to know better job opportunities/ placements after completion of graduation and part time earnings during graduation period also. We provide the leadership skills, marketing skills, communication skills, team

building skills of the students through lectures and other additional program's of the institution. Though the college is having single faculty our students are doing B.ED., LL.B., M.A., MBA and Excellent farmers and Excellent enterpreuner. The list of alumni also support this.

Challenges

Since the college is located in rural area,majority students admitted in the college are from the poor, farmers, socially backward family class. Lack of interest is their in education and related activites. However it is challenge infront of the facultes to make awareness of education among students and their parents. Due to lack of knowledge and economic condition many students has to work in thier farm or others farm in the season. So to divert their mind towards education and accommodate them in the stream of education. The progression of the girl student from UG to PG is less due to rural background and poor mentality of the parents of the region and early age of marriage.

- v. Certain items of college stationary like test and tutorial books mark sheets, college letter heads, etc.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The college is affiliated to the Swami Ramanand Tirth Marathawada University, Nanded, which frames the curriculum for all the courses. The syllabus of these offered courses are displayed on SRTMU, Nanded website. The web link of University is also given to the students. As well the syllabus is dictated in the classroom to the students. The Time Table and Yearly Planning Committee make framework of the total pattern about the implementation of the syllabus with the yearly and monthly planning of the academic year. All the heads of department in consultation with their faculty members, schedule an academic calendar before the commencement of the session. Relevant books are also recommended by the teachers to the students along with the prescribed syllabus. Besides, the class tests are conducted by the college. Apart from regular and traditional teaching methods, faculties impart the curriculum through innovative teaching methods such as assignments, group discussion, seminars, workshops, visits to various colleges and universities in Maharashtra. At the outset, the Principal conducts meetings with faculties to develop the various strategies for effective implementation of the curriculum and the faculties are prompted to use ICT tools while teaching in classrooms

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The College is affiliated, is well transacted to the students after serious preparation as well as critical thought by the teachers concerned. Being an affiliated institution we are always in tune into the latest trends in education and guidelines. Institution follows the syllabus given by the parent University. The teachers study the syllabus and design the action plan of curriculum and dictate it to the students. The Principal of the college inspects the work of teachers through

various meetings & take the students feedback which in turn is communicated to the teachers. The faculty of the college discuss their academic issues or problems while participating in the meeting of Board of Studies. Even though, few teachers communicate with the BOS of their subject about the contents of the syllabus. The college also encourages teachers to participate in the Orientation / Refresher Course /Workshop / Seminar organized by the affiliating universities and other institutions. It improves the teaching methods and help them to keep knowledge updated. Teachers have an easy access to the library of the college for knowledge upgradation. The college has subscribed various journals and books related to different subjects. The college also encourages research aptitude among teachers in all possible ways.

Though the curriculum is designed and revised by the parent University, but for effective curriculum delivery weightage is given to academic improvement and at the same time importance is given to overall development of students by encouraging them to work with various forums of the college such as Student Council, NSS and Campus development. The college relies upon the globally trusted and followed teaching strategy i.e., the chalk and talk method. However, the college and teaching faculty have taken many initiatives for effective deliverance of the curriculum. The Heads of Departments of our college informally meet the member of Board of Studies and HOD of other colleges and discuss about the changes in the curriculum and examination patterns of the university. The college faculties are trained in computers which make them familiar with the usage of computersand use the modern technological resources like Internet, LCD Projector for innovative classroom teaching. The college also organizes Personality Development Programme for the stakeholders. In addition to the regular subject classes, the college also organizes special lectures by inviting experts from various fields to share their knowledge with the students. The students are also taken out for educational tours to provide them firsthand knowledge. To create social and environmental awareness among the students, value education and environmental studies are integrated into the curriculum.

Certain skill oriented programmes like Home Science are adopted which help to increase employability & entrepreneurship among the students. Apart from the above all, our N.S.S. unit is very active. Through various activities of the NSS our students get stage courage, leadership qualities, morals for community service etc. Similarly the Career Counseling and Guidance Cell invite the renowned and MPSC selected scholar guest/speakers for creating the enthusiasm and zeal among the students about the competitive examinations. These programmes are always energy creating among the students. This activity is the most useful to the stakeholders. In such programmes, the students publish scholarly and studied wallpapers prepared by them and guided by our department faculties. We also celebrate various renowned leader's, thinker's and writers' birth and death anniversaries with the publication of the wallpapers on the contributions of the personalities.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

We do not have such flexibility.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The college has to follow the framed syllabus of the University. Board of Studies of University frame the syllabus while some of our faculties are working in Board of Studies. They give suggestions to the Board of Studies, about curriculum as well as frame the syllabus by editing the books of syllabus. Principal Dr. Nagnath Patil was member of BOS and Faculty Member for Marathi of SRTM University, Nanded, and Dr. K.D. Chavan ,Asst.prof of Marathi who is the member on the Editorial board of the university and edited two books i.e. *Sahitya gatha and Sahitya Dhara* for BA I and II year respectively.

At UG level the college is following University's instructions about the compulsory paper entitled 'Environmental Studies' for third year in all streams. The syllabus has been designed and developed in such a way by the University that ecology and environment protection and preservation, value orientation, global and national demands have made their entry significantly in the course of time by the study of the subject.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

As discussed above, the college strictly adheres to the syllabus designed by Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded; but while teaching to the students, our faculties are bound to make the all-round development of the students with help of updated new syllabus of university. In the same way we provide computer facilities in library with Internet facility to the students. The other technologies like Computers, LCD projectors, Dish T.V. have been used for effective communication and teaching. Through our Career and Counseling Cell, we organize the speeches of the various successful officers and eminent personalities from the various

departments. Also college helps to develop communication skill in students for their wholesome development.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The cross cutting issues like Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT, Right To Information Act etc, find an ample space when it comes to applying them positively along with the curriculum. The college, at its own level and with the assistance make arrangements for students where in the experts from above mentioned fields are invited to share and deliver their experiences and knowledge and awareness about Human right and Right to information and also discuss quries of te students. The Management too has supported the cause of the education thereby offering EBC, Scholarship, Free ship, PST and SST, Merit student. College have Women's Grievance Cell, Grievance Redressal and Anti ragging committee. The Women's Grievance Cell sensitizes the students about current issues. The cell creates an awareness of the socio-cultural, political and biological complexities of the issue. In collaboration with units, the cell organizes guest lectures on the gender biases and androgenous personality, women's rights, etc. Blood donation camp and Free checkup for different diseases among common public and free medical checkup of cattle, Water Conservation, Save woman and child programme were organized by the NSS wing.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students? Moral and ethical values employable and life skills better career options community orientation.

The institution as such does not offer any value added courses. However there are many enrichment programmes which are regularly organized to develop different skills of the students along with the course work. Earn and Learn Scheme isimplemented to engage the students in Campus development and NSS Unit engage the students in community development activities which motivate the students to take up the courses of social services.

Moral and Ethical Values:

The college NSS team visits surrounding areas and village where awareness on various social, moral, ethical principles and way of life is imparted. The students are also motivated by way of special lecturers so as to instill moral and ethical values in them.

Employable and life skills:

The college is aware that the need of communication skill is vital for the students for better career options. Therefore, institution arranges group discussion, essay-writing competitions, hand writing workshops at regular intervals in regional and English language. College organizes State level Debate competition on the Joint eve of University Foundation Day and Marathwada Mukti Sangram Din. Such competitions help the students to improve stage courage. The students are also allotted different responsibilities in organizing various events and activities, such as cultural programmes /competition etc. students are encouraged to voluntarily enroll for such activities. In this way they improve their team building and organizational skills. The Women's Grievance Cell provides the knowledge/tips to develop various skills useful for future life to girl students.

Better career options:

The college offeres Home Science subject to the girl students which develop their skills of basic stitching, dress designing, preparation of different recipes, interior decoration, diet for different age group people etc. Such courses are available for young girls which are usefuin their not only personal life but also enhance their employability & impart entrepreneurial skills needed for their business.

Community orientation:

As far as community orientation is concerned, NSS unit in the college that helps to inculcate the spirit of civic values among the students. Students are also sensitized to various national problems & are given training to serve society with a human touch. NSS candidates help to police department at the time of *Ganpati Festival*, *Navratri festival* and election period. The college organizes various social welfare programmes, for instance, a free Medical Camp for common people in the month of Dec.2013. More than hundred needy people were examined and given free medicines for their ailments. However free veterinary camp was organized on Jan.2012. Since from last 8 years, Blood Donation Camp is organized each year on the occasion of Birthday of our Beloved President Dr. Jayprakashji Mundada. The Marathwada region is known for lack of rainfall and there is scarcity of water therefore water conservation is one of the main task in NSS camp at villages. An awareness programme on female feticide was also conducted in the college.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

In order to keep pace with the fast changing trends in the academic scenario, the teachers use the feedback from students, parents, employers and other stake holders. The institution has various

channels to collect documents, responses on curriculum from the stakeholders. The Principal, being the head of the institution is responsible for collecting feedback from the stakeholders through periodic meetings. The Principal's office will then process and submit the analysis report and present it to the college Managing Committee. The Principal reviews the analysis reports and initiate interventions. With this, the Principal collects the feedback from the stakeholders about the activities of the faculties during the every academic year. After collection of these feedback forms from the students, the Principal conveys the strong points and lacunas from the teaching skills with the help of the letters. After getting the suggestions from the Principal, teachers make improvements in their teaching style as well as improve the understanding of the students with the use of ICT etc.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The institution monitors and evaluates the quality of its enrichment programmes through constitution of various committees like Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), Grievance Redressal Cell and Library Advisory Committee for improvement in the teaching method, completion of the course and various development initiatives to be taken. The institution has a very clear and transparent way to monitor and evaluate the quality of various enrichment programmes initiated by it. The feedback in the form of interactions, discussions and suggestions is analyzed by a constituted committee and report is submitted to the head of the Department. An advisory committee meets with the higher authority like Principal and the Managing Committee from time to time and amends the enrichment programmes to meet the desired objective. The institution makes sure that the programmes offered in the curriculum include contribution to national development. In the same way the college uses education as tool for empowering women and through the transaction of the curriculum it has adopted, it seeks to address the all round development of the students enrolled in the various academic programs.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The institution is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded and therefore, there is no scope for framing institution's curriculum on its own. We have to follow University syllabus. Since, systematic mechanism is installed in the institution to look after the affairs of the feedback process and analysis through members of Board of Studies. Faculties of departments of the college, informally meet the member of Board of Studies and HOD of other

colleges to discuss the changes in curriculum. Faculty members regularly attend workshop and seminar arranged by university or other institutions regarding design and development of curriculum.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes, the college has a well established system of collecting feed back from its stake holders. The Principal of the college take feedback from the students about the teaching style, understanding of the subject, MCQ, communication between students and teachers. After collecting this feedback from the stakeholders, the Principal of the college communicate with the faculties and hand over the strong and weak points of the faculties in the college. The feedbacks are discussed in the staff council meetings. The institution encourages various stakeholders such as students, alumni, faculty to give their feedback and communicate it to the relevant authority to the university through suitable channel. The institution collects all feedback and communication in the form of questionnaires and forms and then on analysisfind out the areas of improvement from it. The feedback are discussed in the staff council meetings. The opinion of the coordinating committee is also taken into account.

College runs only Arts Faculty and no new courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years.

TEACHING LEARNING & EVALUATION

2.1 Student enrolment and profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process? Publicity

The college has well set & tested regulation for admission of students to B.A. The college employs the following measures

a) Advertisement:

All relevant information regarding the admission procedure, infrastructure, fee & scholarships, various activities of the college, achievements of the students in academic as well as sports and other activities is conveyed through advertisement and is being done through pamphlets, flexes at main roads, mouth publicity by our students, Alumni students and faculty members & non-teaching staff. Sometimes, our faculty visits to nearby villages and aware the students about various programmes specially for girls as college runs courses like Home Science and Geography which are practical oriented and the importance of the girls education is discussed in group.

b) Institutional Website:

The institution has an updated website. All the information regarding institution and admission process, faculty etc. are displayed on website www.yoganandcollege.org

c)Transparency

As our institution is situated in remote area and we do not have much junior colleges in the area, our quota of admission is always fulfilled. The admissions are being allotted on first come first served basis. There is no issue of donation or extra fees. Hence admission process is totally transparent and social justice is ensured.

2.1.2. Explain in details the criteria adopted and process of admission(Ex.(i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

The college has constituted an admission committee comprising of four teachers who are involved in the admission committee for selection of eligible students on the basis of 'first come first admit'. The counseling team helps the students to make the choice of subjects.

The committee scrutinizes the application form with respect to fulfillment of the eligibility criteria prescribed for admission by the SRTM University, Nanded. The Collage follows reservation policy of the State Government.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating University within the city / district.

The selection of the students for B.A. degree is made on the basis of rules of SRTM University, Nanded. We give admission to the students those who pass in 12th Arts and D.Ed. The following chart shows the minimum and maximum percentage of admitted students during last five years.

The college tried to collect the required data for comparison from the other colleges of the town /district but could not procure such data.

2.1.4. Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process & student profile annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The institution has a mechanism to review the admission process & student profile annually. Yes, there is an Admission Committee and after completion of admission process, committee members review the admission process and student profiles. The outcome of such an effort

results in bringing about transparency, streamlining and systematizing the admission process, following up of reservation policy strictly as per provision of the government and selection of meritorious and disciplined students from the weaker sections. In case a particular section of students like Girls or any specific community are found to be in less numbers in the admission lists, the admission committee tries to motivate those sections of students by providing them the requisite facilities. The student with a little bit of negative approach or disturbing elements are motivated with counseling so that a positive frame of mind can be developed. This result in making the students become an asset for the institution.

We enroll students belonging to all categories on first come first served basis. No student is denied admission till date.

* SC/ST/OBC/minority & economically weaker section

Students from SC/ST and other backward classes are allotted seats as per roaster system of the state policy. Fees exemption and endowment benefits are extended to these students. The college makes tireless efforts to create awareness on the importance of higher studies i.e. education as a means of socio-economic change and a means empowerment. The college staff visits the neighboring and surrounding areas in the border area for orientation and counseling of the students who belong to the non creamy layers.

Economically weaker sections

Free ships and other concessions are available to them. Even candidates with low percentage are accepted, if seats are available. They are also given various benefits like fee concession, free books etc.

* Women

Women candidates are provided with equal opportunity. Counseling is provided to needy parents and student on the importance of women education.

* Differently able

In admission process equal opportunity is given to differently able students. We provide library facilities, front seating in the classroom to such students. eg. For Polio-affected students are allotted their infrastructural facilities in such a manner that their classes are held on the ground-floor and sufficient care is taken to provide them and comforts.

* Sports persons

Students of our institution are given admission based upon their excellence in athletics or sports activities at regional or state level. Preference is given during admissions to the sports persons.

College provide admission to all students. As the sanctioned number of students for First Year admission is 120 students. However in case of extra application some time college take special permission from affiliated university for 10% extra admission of student.i.e. up to 12 student. Spot admissions are available in our institution within the stipulated dates. The condition of unemployment in D.T. Ed. courses after 2011, the results increased of the first year students. Overall trend in admission is mounting because of availability of highly qualified teachers, infrastructural facilities, student-centric teaching-learning process and transparent and good governance.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-able students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institution strictly follows educational policies of Govt. of Maharashtra regarding differently able students. The institution as a whole, maintain an open door policy with respect to the needs of differently able students. Polio-afflicted students are allotted such classes that are held on the ground-floor. Such students are also given half an hour extra time in the terminal and final Examination. For them front seating arrangements are made available in the classroom, easy accessibility of books in library, Writer provision for differently able student as per university directives and for physically challenged student and staff—ramp is construction in infrastructure facilities itself.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the student's needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The college is situated in rural area of Marathwada region of Maharashtra. The Institution is well aware of the needs of the students. Some times students may be in confusion about selection of subjects at the time of admission. The college is the ladder which can help them climb up to the world of their aspirations. The class comprises a mix of intelligent and average students. We admit students of all calibers in line with our objective EDUCATION FOR ALL. In order to satisfy their queries the college ensures that there are teachers available to answer their doubts. Apart from this, before the commencement of the programme team of teachers personally contact the Principals of the senior secondary schools located in the district and request to let their students interact with the team so as to access the student's need in terms of knowledge and skills. Counseling & orientation is done by the admission committee. In order to satisfy queries & doubts of the students the teachers are always available.

2.2.3. what are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/ Remedial / Add-on/ Enrichment courses) etc.

Newly enrolled students have options to change faculty or subject within 15 days from the actual beginning of college. Till date we haven't organized Remedial Coaching however the it is accomplished by coaching on personal level. To bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students and to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice, the following strategies are drawn and Deployed by the institution: Slow learners are identified. Peer learning is encouraged in a sense that meritorious students are asked to help the slow learners. Simplified versions of books are recommended to them. Special tests are conducted for them.

2.2.4. How does the college sensitize its staff & students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college aims to impart holistic education with sufficient weightage to ethical, moral principles. Our college has a co-educational system. It sensitizes its staff & students on issues like gender inclusion, environment etc, by holding various programmes like participation in rally on female foeticide, women empowerment and by Celebration of women's day, Savitribai Phule birth anniversary etc.. As stated earlier, college offers the subject of environmental studies as a compulsory subject for third year students irrespective of any streams at UG level. NSS wing of the college sensitize staff and students on various socio-cultural issues. The college teachers sensitize their students on issues such as gender inclusion, environment etc. by holding talks/discussion on the current affairs regularly in their classes. Staff and students are sensitized on various burning issues during regular discussion among them selves.

2.2.5. How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners are detected by the teachers during their lectures in class room by means of getting feedback from the students orally and sometimes in writing. Students are subjected to various methods of evaluation like signaled answers, vocal responses, and sample individual's responses and written test after each unit of syllabus. Based on their performance students are identified as slow and advanced learners. The teachers take extra pain in helping them with an additional and personal interest. They are provided additional learning materials and healthy cooperation from the teacher. Further advanced learners are motivated for higher education, career options. For competitive exams like MPSC, banking sector, revenue, college organise extra classes for students and staff of the college spend extra time for them after college hours. Slow learners are supported in the best possible manner to channelize there potential for success.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged section of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

As it is stated our institution is situated in rural area, the students from the all category section of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. are admitted in the college. The teacher detects it during their lectures in class. We use the various methods of evaluation, like vocal responses, sample individuals responses like seminars and group discussions after each unit of syllabus. The college collects data and information on the academic performance of the students at risk of drop out, from class tests and house tests. Such data is used to make strategies to improve the academic performance of the disadvantaged sections of

society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections and minimize their dropout rate by taking following measures:

□ Disadvantaged sections of society

Liberal fee concession, free books are provided. Free books and financial assistance are provided to students from category class.

□Physically challenged

Time Table is set and rooms are allotted to them keeping in view their convenience. Polio-afflicted students are allotted their time-table in such a manner that their classes are held on the ground-floor.

Economically weaker sections

Free ships and other concessions are available to them. Even candidates with low percentage are accepted, if seats are available. Free books, scholarships, student welfare fund and financial assistance are provided to students of minority community. Liberal concessions are given depending on their merit.

□Slow learners

Peer learning is provided. Remedial classes are organized for such slow learners. Their daily homework is checked to monitor their progress. Simplified versions of books are recommended to them. /Special tests are conducted for them.

The creative abilities of students are given vent through wall papers college magazines. A friendly environment is created to improve the communication skills towards advanced learners. A number of motivational lectures are organized to channelize their potential to achieve success. The students belonging to economically weaker sections are being incorporated in 'Student Adoption Scheme' of the college where they get some financial assistance.

2.3 Teaching-learning process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize to teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic Calendar, Teaching Plan, Evaluation, Blue Print etc.)

In the beginning of each academic year, the academic calendar is released by the affiliating University which is to be followed by the college. The same academic calendar is displayed on notice board before the beginning of the session of every academic year. It provides plan for the complete academic year to the students and teachers. Each department functions according to the teaching plan prepared at the department level. The faculty follows instructions regarding teaching learning process so that the institutional objectives to be achieved. The various kinds of aids and the equipments are used inside the classroom to make teaching learning ease for the

students. A copy of the teaching plan is submitted to the Principal. Time table is prepared and displayed on the notice board. All faculties keep the record of teaching in terms of DTR.(Daily Teaching Report). The department also carry out internal assessment based on students test performance and punctuality as per rules of university. The final evaluation of students is done according to the University evaluations of the examination, results are declared and marks sheets are issued by the affiliating University.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC provides the development and application of quality benchmarks/parameters for the various academic and administrative activities of the institution. The IQAC imparts knowledge through team work at relentless efforts. It promotes the research and consultancy to faculty members. It also ensures timely, efficient and progressive performance of academic, administrative and financial tasks. The committee always promotes the faculties from the college to participate in various seminars, workshops, conferences and provide various data for the submission of research papers of the various journals and periodicals. The committee organized one-day workshop on "NAAC Methodology" for college faculties. The resource person Principal Vijaykumar S. Kanwate and Prof. Kalyan R.Kadam (Coordinator, NAAC, Nagnath College, Aundha nagnath) addressed the staff of the college.

- Over the past many years, faculty has been participating in the national and international conferences and presenting papers in regional, state, national and international level seminars.
- The college organized one day workshop "Subject of Public Administration Syllabus Curriculum" with the support of SRTMU, Nanded.
- The college library has subscribed to various journals related to different subjects.
- Newspapers and Internet are used on daily basis to keep up latest advancements in a particular field.
- Prominent scholars and eminent subject matter specialist from society are invited to exhibit their pedantry for the benefit of the students.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students/benefited) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

• There is a provision for counseling /advising to the needy students for academic and personal guidance. It is done at all level of courses in all the division. The teacher in- charge carefully monitors the regularity of attendance, participation in seminars and other activities and also the performance of the students in internal tests/ semester examinations. The competitive examinations were conducted by Carrier and Counseling Cell under the guidance of the scholar teachers of the cell. Apart from this, the cell displays the various employment opportunities, articles, advertisements and other needful on the notice board of the college. Each faculty fond out the week students in the class and help accordingly wherever necessary.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The following innovative teaching approaches/methods have been adopted by the faculty during the last four years:

- Newer teaching methods, such as, television, CD players, computer and other modern devices are also used.

- The teachers are being sent to refresher and orientation courses to update their knowledge.
 They are encouraged to use computers, internet and library resources to enrich their teaching.
 The college faculty also provided training to prepare PPT so that they can implement the modern teaching aid in their classrooms.
- The filmed dramas and novels are also shown to students.
- A recent effort made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative
 approaches is the introduction of smart boards and the impact of such innovative practices on
 student learning lies in their being enthused into smart classrooms and participate
 interactively.
- The faculty members are encouraged to participate in regional, state, national & international level seminar. The faculty members who attend such seminar /conferences share their experiences with students and faculty with latest information and talent development.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The library resources are used to augment the teaching-learning process in the manner below:

- 1.Books and magazines are purchased by the college on regular basis for knowledge up gradation.
- 2.Newspapers and Internet are used on daily basis to keep track of the latest advancements in a particular field.
- 3. A new Reading Room furnished with tables, chairs and counters has been created for the students.
- 4. A separate periodical section has been created in the library.
- 5. A Book Bank has been functioning in the college, providing books to underprivileged students. The Book Bank in managed by a committee of teachers and library volunteers.
- 6. Special help is rendered to students preparing for competitions.
- 7. Old question papers of House tests and final exams in all the subjects are made available to the students.
- 8.Copies of syllabi prescribed by the university, with question-wise division of marks etc. are also available to students for ready reference.
- 9. Library is opened even during holidays during preparation for youth festivals, debates etc.
- 10. The library staff keeps the faculty and the students updated regarding its latest acquisitions.
- 11. The information regarding new arrivals is also given through the college notice board.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The faculty members complete curriculum within the stipulated time frame. To develop skills and holistic personality of students, the institution encourages students to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and, thus, faces a challenge in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar. However, the college takes special classes of such students during autumn, winter break, gazetted holidays and even Sundays and other times convenient to them during the whole session. The institution faces problem in the case of slow learners. By providing them remedial classes, the institution overcomes the problem. The IQAC keeps a check on the syllabus covered by the various departments on regular basis.

IQAC through interaction with faculty members submit reports of the feedback to the Principal. The feedback from students and teachers is useful to monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning. Principal of the college annually takes the feedback from students. This feedback in turn is communicated to faculty with suggestions if any. Besides, the college Grievance Redressal Mechanism also takes care of the quality of teaching learning

2.4 Teacher Quality

The institute follows the rules and regulations laid by State Govt. of Maharashtra, Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded and UGC. The college is always ready to recruit qualified teachers. The college seeks the permission for recruitment, teachers are filled by the procedure as follows. First of all, the institute takes permission from Joint Director of higher education and then from the university with reservation criteria. After this, advertisement is given in national / state level news papers. After getting applications in response to advertisement the eligible candidates are scrutinized. Thereafter the college applies to the affiliating University for a panel of expert to conduct the interview. Call letters are issued to qualified candidates for interview. This expert panel consists of the following members.

- * President of the College Management Committee Or a person nominated by Management.
- * Govt. nominee.

The above said committee conducts the interview as per the guidelines issued by the SRTMU selects the eligible and most competent candidates. After giving them the appointment letters, the approval is sought from the affiliating university. To retain the available staff, they are paid salaries according to the grades specified by the SRTMU Nanded. The staff is provided other requisite facilities like, medical leave, casual leave etc. They are also given study leave if they wish to upgrade their qualification by pursuing M. Phil or Ph.D. Management is always trying to select the staff as suggested by University nominated subject experts,V.C. nominees, Government nominee following the rules and regulations given by the UCG and university for time to time. The Principal and Management encourage staff members to achieve higher degrees in the field of education to upgrade them.

Studies and HODs of other colleges to discuss the changes in the curriculum. The faculty members study the new syllabus to be implemented in the classrooms. 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external peers? If yes, how is the evolution used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes, our institute gets evaluation of the teachers done by the students and external peers. The head of the institution takes feedback of the teachers from the students. At the end of every academic year, students give feedback of each faculty member on their teaching skills in a prescribed format. The feedback mainly focuses on the various teaching skills of the faculty members like presentation, healthy interaction and content covered, innovative practices adopted laboratory work and learning resources, use of teaching aids. The faculty is communicated in written individual strength and weakness and necessary changes are suggested for improvement in the performance.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms:

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The stakeholders of the institution i.e. students and faculty members and even the parents of the students are informed about evaluation process by giving general instructions. The periodic instructions issued by the parent university are promptly communicated to the students. The faculty members read these instructions even in the classrooms and copy of the same is also displayed on the students 'notice-board. Likewise they are also informed at the start of the session itself regarding the terminal tests after the gap of three months. Students are clearly made aware of the eligibility conditions required to appear in the final exams. They are informed of the criterion of the internal assessment. The evaluation is the integral part of teaching learning process. So, the institution makes effective arrangements for the smooth application of the rules about the evaluation processes. The college has developed a proper mechanism for this purpose. Time to time staff meetings are also conducted concerning evaluation process of students.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The students are evaluated by group discussions presentation seminars and some times, by written tests. It makes the evaluation more interesting for students. Faculty members also try new

innovation in their teaching skills to make evaluation more beneficial for the students. The university has initiated various evaluation reforms viz.

- 1. Introduction of internal assessment system.
- 2. Introduction of O.M.R Answer Sheets.
- 3. Introduction of table marking and evaluation through secret roll nos. so as to make each evaluation process more transparent.
- 4. Introduction of objective questions in the question papers.

The college has adopted various university reforms concerning evaluation viz.

- 1. Following university pattern of question papers in house examination.
- 2. Internal assessment is awarded to the students as per the university criteria.
- 3. Class tests and unit tests are conducted to evaluate the performance of students.
- 4. Student centric learning through assignments, projects, seminars and practical sessions.

Unit test of TY students are conducted to evaluate the performance of students. Student-centric learning is applying through assignments, projects and practical sessions.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The evaluation reforms of the University are followed in the best of the spirit. The students are made satisfied by showing them the evaluated performance in the answer sheets. Any doubt about evaluation is made clear to the students. The records are maintained i.e. evaluated answer sheets, award list etc by the college examination department. Whenever class test and common test are conducted the results of the student's performance / awards are shown to the students to encourage them or counsel them for better performance. The institution follows improvements in examination system suggested by Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded from time to time.

Formative assessment

The goal of formative assessment is to monitor student's learning, Feedback is taken to improve teaching and learning process. Formative assessment of the student is done on the following parameters.

- 3.Presentations
- 4. Field visits
- 5.Practical
- 6. Unit test
- 7. Class interactions
- 8. Social activities through NSS and Cultural Department

Summative assessment

The goal of the summative assessment is to evaluate students learning at the end of session /semester. For the summative approach common tests are conducted in the college. From these tests the students get clear idea to improve their performance for final examination. This is the formative & summative evaluation approaches in the college.

2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the student's results/achievements (programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the Programmes/courses offered.

Academic performance, regularity, participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities, etc. plays a vital role in the progress of the students. The following monitoring methods are adopted by the institution. The academic performance is monitored by observing the students' performance in classroom through discussion, interaction and assignment. Monitoring is also done by observing their performance in the internal examinations and final annual examinations taking both theoretical and practical aspects into considerations. The answer books are shown and supplied to the students. Common test is also conducted in the month of February every year for students which are helpful for final examinations. The discipline and regularity of the students is monitored by recording presence /absence in every class. The parents are informed through the letter or even telephonically (about absentee, weak students). After identifying areas of interest in co-curricular and extracurricular activities, the students' participation / is recorded. All the staff members continually involve in student's personal issues and offer help whenever necessary by all possible ways.

There is transparency in the internal assessment. The criterion adopted is as directed by the university. College makes it compulsory for all the students to attend internal assessment and vive-voce examination of the university. After completion of internal assessment/vive-voce /practical exams, the record is submitted by the concerned teacher to the university. The internal assessment is made by the faculty member keeping in mind the following aspects/factors of student's performance during the academic year.

- 1 Class performance
- 2 Unit test/common test
- 3 Response in the examinations

In spite of all the above aspects the students behavioral aspect, independent learning and communication skills and other hidden talents etc. are also taken in to consideration during the assessment of students.

Yes. The institution uses assessment and evaluation both as an indicator for evaluating student's performance. The students who excel in the academic, sports or extracurricular activities are

given due advantage in assessment. General classroom behavior, active participation in college activities of the students is also kept in mind when evaluation of a student is undertaken.

College examination

The student has free access to the subject teacher. The students having grievances regarding evaluation process or doubt are made clear by showing his/her performance in the answer sheets and suggestion are given to improve their performance in better way.

With regard to university examination, there is a mechanism adopted by the University for redressal of grievances within 15 days after the announcement of the results. Students can apply for re-evaluation/ re-counting. Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded makes arrangement for issuing photocopies of their answer scripts to the students after application submitted by the claimant.

Apart from this on the Eve of *Marathwada Mukthi SangramDin* and University Foundation Day of S.R.T.M.U. Nanded, our College has been organizing regional Debate Competition. The motto to start this competition was to create new platform for hidden qualities of youngsters and to develop their personality. We deliberately try to attempt the most burning issues of that particular time period. Student get chance to come like group leader or team leader. Many eminent personalities got shape through such Debate Competition. On the occasions of the birth anniversary and death anniversary of national leaders & social reformers, the programmes as like elocution competition, debate competitions and essay writings has been arranged by various department of the college. Some students are being sent to the debate competitions organized by various colleges, and universities with help of the Cultural Department.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The mission and objectives of the college are prominently displayed in the information broacher given to the students at the time of admission. The college website provides adequate space to this mission. They find place in all the offices of the college, library and other major buildings of the college. Immediately after admission, the students are made aware of these mission and objectives. The institute has evolved a stakeholder's web by forming different platform like Research Committee, Alumni with a fair representation of students. The IQAC in the planning process considers feedback collected from the entire stakeholder to prepare perspective on development. These developments prospective will be discussed in there sportive committee. The reflection of the meeting will be incorporated in the plan. Institute is highly concerned with its stakeholder i.e. includes students, parents, staff, alumni. 'Earn and Learn Scheme & Student Help Fund' is funding students from poor family and socially backward classes who can't pay their tuition fees or any other fees. With the help of this scheme students get some relief and he/she could complete the degree without breaking his /her education.

- Parents of any student are allowed to meet the teachers, Coordinators and Principal on any day of the week at any time to make any suggestions or complaints.

Staff:

- We have regular staff meetings to keep the staff updated about changes and developments of the institute.
- Most of the decisions are taken only after consultation with the staff during staff meeting.

Alumni:

We have constituted an alumni Association with a Professor In-Charge. The association organizes meetings and has regular formal and informal interactions wherein any alumnus is free to give their suggestions

Besides to it various extension activities viz. lectures, skill development programmes etc Free Health Checkup & Medical Camps were organized for the residents of village. To spread awareness about legal rights seminars are regularly organized in the adopted village and institutions. Besides, various activities were undertaken in order to inculcate a sense of social responsibility among the volunteer. Various campaigns and rallies have been organized all round the city to extend awareness about many things like female feticide, save girl child, plantation of tree etc. Volunteers continuously strive to spread environment awareness about the need for saving water, electricity and to make the earth a better place to live in. Blood Donation Camps are regularly organized to save many precious human lives. The motto of the volunteers

on the occasion is that no one in the society should die due to lack of timely supply of free blood. Vocational training, workshop was conducted for the girl students of Home Science Department Unit. Approximately 50 girls are learning Stitching and Embroidery Skills for self employment.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1. Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

In order to create and enhance the infrastructure that facilitates effective teaching and learning, the policy is framed according to the strength of students in different streams. The policy also conforms to the strength of the lecturers appointed in the institution. With the increase in strength of students as per requirement, the institution approaches UGC for various funds. The management actively offers help when any infrastructural change is required. Since present infrastructure is not adequate, the institution has to travel long in this regard.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

- a) Curricular and co-curricular activities: Classroom, technology enabled learning, Halls, RO water purifier system, wash area and tutorial spaces, laboratories, specialized facilities like LCD projector, TV set, computers, internet facilities and other facilities like equipment for teaching, learning and research etc. are provided for effective teaching and learning.
- b) Extracurricular activities: Sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, NSS activities cultural activities. Public speaking and communication skill development, health and hygiene etc. activities are conducted for the wholesome developments of students. The college is endowed with excellent physical infrastructure facilities to support the teaching learning process. The main campus is spread over 3.4 acres of land. However the built up area is 3005 sq.meter. A master plan has been prepared for the campus. Our college has spacious multipurpose hall, adequate number of classrooms, few chambers, well equipped laboratories. The library is established with adequate space separate reading section for boys girls and staff and Large numbers of books and journals.

The college has an out-door sports ground for sports activities. The infrastructure involves spacious class rooms, proper lighting and ventilation, seating arrangement with sufficient visibility for the both students and lecturers. There is facility of common room for boys and girls separately. Special arrangements for canteen for the students and the staff, provision of staff-room and the auditorium .The details of the facilities available with the institution are as under:

(A) For curricular and co-curricular activities:

i) Class rooms:

The college has 11 spacious class rooms with proper light criterion and ventilation, dias and podium. Each Classroom is having approximately 475 Sq. ft. carpet area with proper light arrangement and ventilation. There is sufficient number of windows which provide air natural light and cross ventilation so the classroom hardly needs artificial lights. Our college has special ladies room for girl-students in the college. The size of auditorium/seminar hall is 900 sq.ft.

- ii) **Technology Enabled Learning facility:** The college has ICT classrooms where the provision of LCD, and internet access is given.
- iii) **Seminar Hall:** The college has one seminar halls. This hall is regularly used for conducting seminars of college, state and national level. Here, the students are regularly promoted for active involvement in paper presentations, group discussions.
- v) **Laboratories:** The college has two equipped laboratories(for the practical's), Department of Home Science and Geography which facilitate students to conduct regular practice during the session and in annual examinations.
- **vi) Garden:** Our college has a well maintained botanical garden where various plants & trees are grown like oxygen generating, shade giving and medicinal value plants etc. The tree like Neem, pimple, banyan, ashoka, champa, fig, amla, papaya etc. are planted in college campus.

vii) Specialized facilities and equipment, available for teaching, learning and research

The college has 5 computers. The ratio of computer and student is 1:25. The staff and students are provided free access to internet so that they can enrich their knowledge benefit from their experiences.

b) Extra Curricular Activities

Indoor games- Facilities for the indoor games like, chess, carom, table tennis etc are provided to the students in the college.

Outdoor games – A spacious half acre planned play ground is available for outdoor games i.e. Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Athletics, Volleyball and Badminton in college campus.

N.S.S. - College has one N.S.S. unit of 100 students. The various awareness campus are organized and need based services are provided by N.S.S. students like participation in blood donation camp, and rallies are organized on the various issues like female feticide, gender mainstreaming, girl education etc. Seven days special programme is organized in nearby village every year, where rural community are awakened with different programmes for raising their standard of living.

Cultural Activities - The college is regularly participating in the youth festival every year. The students have been participating in all academic, theatrical and musical events. The college also organizes the annual gathering where students hidden talent are exposed through various events and they are motivated for further sucess.

Public speaking communication and skill development —Personality development programmes are organized by the college which involves various activities like public speaking and communication development etc. for raising their self esteem and confidence building. Besides this, the college faculties keep on enriching, the students with communication skills under Career Oriention Programme for their personality development.

Health and hygiene – In addition to above mentioned activities; our college has a very special concern for the health& hygiene of the college students, staff and other members. The college organizes free medical checkup camps regularly.





These students are provided every possible help during their stay in the college. As it is stated earlier, our college is situated in rural area. Majority of the students are from S.C., S.T. and O.B.C. category. The central Govt., State Govt., and open merit scholarship and concessions are given to such students in the college. This scheme was started in the year 2012. In this practice principlal deduct Rs.500/month and the teaching faculties deduct Rs.200/ month however non teaching staff gives Rs.100/-month for the Student Aid Fund. Through this practice we are able to provide economical support to the stakeholders

Students with physical disabilities

There is reservation for students belonging to differently abled category or physically challenged students as per UGC notifications. The college ensures that infrastructure facilities meet the requirement of the students with physical disabilities; it is ensured that they don't have any physical obstruction. Such students are given extra attention during the college examination as well as in the final examination. Ramp is constructed for these student for providing aid in their movement.

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

Our college has special concern for the health & hygiene of the student. The college organized blood group checkup camp through N.S.S. unit. In order to provide basic facilities, proper arrangement of pure and safe drinking water (RO water) is present. First aid box arrangement is made available by the institution. In case in any major emergency, the college is just half kilometer away from the Rural Hospital of Basmat. The Medical Officers from rural hospital cooperate and renders help to the institute.

□ Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

In order to strengthen the students for competitive examinations we have career counseling & guidance cell. Through this cell guest lecturers, eminent speakers are invited which proves very

useful for the students. The admitted students are guided for their career through this cell as per their aptitude and intrest.

□ Skill development (Home Science, Geography, etc.,)

The college regularly conducts personality Development Programmes which enhance their proficiency and communication skills of the students. The courses like Home science is offered for girl students only while Geography is offered for both girls and boys. These courses are practical based which provide basic knowledge about textile like tie and die, stitching, knitting, designer saree making ,development of best out of waste, development of paper mashie, Nutrition based practical, catering to preparation of different recipes and preservation, bakery products etc which help girls for not only knowledge but also their economic empowerment who aspire to start their enterprise. The course like Geography which gives technical knowledge about measurement of land, weather report, geographical studies of area also helps the students detail about the various aspects of land.

The college published its annual magazine *Srujan*. The students of the college enthusiastically contribute their articles in the magazine. The college magazine is printed in the supervision of the college editorial board. The students pointribute in this magazine with their short stories, poems and articles etc. Faculty members also contributed in the magazine. The various **Department Study Circles** of the college published wall posters from their department with their thoughts and other important topics from the current issues of the state and nation.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

The Career Counseling and Guidance cell is working in our college. The Teacher In Charge is available for all the working days and guring working hours to guide the job opportunities/employments to the students. The counseling cell make adequate arrangement for the guidance of the students at the time of admission. The students seeking admissions are counseled in the choice making of courses during admissions. The choice of the career and the doubts of the students are considered very carefully and solutions are provided.

□ Academic and career counseling

The students, at the time of the admission are helped by the faculty in choosing right stream. They are informed about the scope and nature of the various subjects from the syllabus in choosing the subject. They are given right kind of counseling which help them to shape their career.

□ Personal and Psycho-Social Counseling

The students during the course of their studies in the college come across various issues. The students are not sufficient mature to handle their problems. The faculty provides them personal counseling. They can share their problems with the teacher. The teachers are very supportive in guiding them to resolve their problems. The teachers make it sure that no such bad or worse happens with the psycho-social understanding of the students. They are counseled to become better human being and advised to become strong for the personal and social cause. Girls feel free to share their problems with lady Teachers. Home Science staff is always there to share girl students problems and have optimum and solutions. The Principal is available in their free time to solve to the various problems of the students.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? The college has career counseling and guidance cell but not the placement guidance cell. After completion of degree, students go for further education like M.A, B.Ed, M.B.A, LLB. The students are informed regarding the vacancies offered by Govt./private sectors and other agencies. Notice of the advertisement is put upon the notice board and the students are given information regarding the vacancies. The college arranged guest lectures from external agency; who guide our students about job opportunities & the student get benefit from it.

Yes. The Grievance Redressal Cell actively interacts with the students to help them to sort out their problem. It attends both registered and unregistered grievances of the students. A chairman and other members work in this committee. The students drop their grievances in the suggestion box. Students are also free to share their grievances with the teachers and the Principal also. The necessary action is taken after detailed discussion in the concerned cell. We are very please to say that till to date very few such cases are reported in the institution, mostly students do not involve into such anti social activities.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

Sexual Harassment Committee was constituted to take all the necessary measures to ensure the safety and the dignity of the female students. The cell comprises the female and male members. Till to date no such case of sexual harassment has been reported in the institution. The strict punishment provisions are made for sexual harassment and this is informed to the students through the meetings. Apart from this, the college premises is under CC TV camera by which the Principal of the college observe the activities of the students, staff and visitors too.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

Yes. The Anti Ragging Committee is constituted in the college. Ragging means the violations of human rights. The UGC has made it mandatory for the institution to incorporate in their prospectus the anti ragging directives of the Central Government. The college is very cautious regarding all ragging issues. It comprises of the Head of the institution and faculty members. The anti ragging committee is assigned to check the students activities and make surprise visit, and make the interaction with fresh students to build their confidence. The Principal of the institution visits the campus and classes to check any kind of harassment of girls as well as boys or any other related issues in the college.

5.1.13 Enumerate the welfare schemes made available to students by the institution.

The institution is working towards social justice through various student welfare schemes. The induction programmes clearly presents the welfare schemes available to the students. Scholarship and freeships are received from various Central, State and other agencies to the institute. Details about these scholarship and freeships are displayed on the notice board. The relevant information is furnished to the students at the time of admission as well as in the classes for time to time. The

college also provides free ships (EBC) on the basis of their economic conditions and based on the students social reservation. The queries and complaints in this regard are being sorted out by scholarship committee in the institute.

Career Counseling and Guidance Cell:

The institution has career counseling &guidance cell. The cell comprising of 3 members. The cell organises various guidance workshops for the students for making aware about job opportunities. The cell displays job opportunities on notice boards and counsel the students based on individual students abilities.

Grievance Redressal Cell:

We ensure the safety and dignity of the female students in classrooms. we have set up grievance redressal cell. Through this cell, both registered and unregistered grievances of the students are attented Apart from this, the complaint cum suggestion box is fixed for collecting & handling the issues of the maximum students effectively.

Question Bank:

Another innovative activity of the institute is that question bank is developed which help to reduce the burden of students. helps to improve success rate in the final examination and also one copy of question bank of each course us available in the library too.

The Prize Distribution:

In the inaugural function of the *Annual Gathering*, the prize distribution programme is organized to inspire the students. The college teachers also encourage the students by declaring the merit from the subjects of the college respectively.

Earn and Learn Scheme:

Earn while you learn scheme is implemented for the students for creating opportunities for the students for their learning as well as earning. For example, students work as helpers during their free periods in the office as well as in the library to get financially self sufficient even as students. All the faculty members deduct Rs.200/- month from their salary and the collected is fund used under this scheme.

The college has formed an Alumni Association under the leadership of Alumni Committee. The committee organizes the Parents Meeting and ex-student Meet every year. Through this meet, we

Language Association cell (Marathi, Hindi and English), Social Science Study Circle, NSS and Cultural Department time to time publishes various **Wall Papers** on the birth anniversaries, death anniversaries of the eminent personalities and patriotic leaders and other occasions every academic year. The Editorial Board comprises of students representatives such as Editor, Co-Editor, Secretary, Treasurer & members. This Board invites written Literature from students and teachers and publishes their articles, in the form of wall papers. This activity totally is done by student under the guidance of the Head /Teachers of respective Study Circles.

Subject Study Board:

Study Circles are formed for each subject which comprise Editor, Co-editor, Secretary, Treasurer and five to seven student members. The various activities are run by this board such as wallpaper publication, essay competition etc. Apart from this, the guests are invited to share their valuable thoughts on the particular subject.

• Library Committee:

We have formed the library committee which includes Principal as the Chairman Librarian as the Secretary and five Professors as members. The committee reviews and decides to purchase of various books, journals, e-Journals, periodicals, News Papers and grants for the development of the library.

Anti Ragging Committee:

We have established anti ragging committee where the Principal is the head of the committee. The Teacher Representatives and the representative of the students organization are member in the committee, Physical Director works as the member in committee.

• N.S.S. Committee:

The Principal is the President of N.S.S. unit. Other two senior lecturers, interested in the social activities work as **Programme Officers** of the unit, two college students one from boys and one from girl students are the student representatives.

Student Welfare Committee:

Students and the senior faculties are involved in the committee which communicates with the universities about the various activities of the Student Welfare Department.

Publication Committee:

Two student representatives and the senior faculties are involved in the committee which actively participates in various publications i.e. College Magazine and Wall papers etc. by the departments.

Cultural Committee:

By keeping in view the need of the people of the region, our founder President, Dr. Jayprakashji Mundada Ex.Co-operative Minister State of Maharashtra and Member of Legislative Assembly(MLA) established Jai Bhavani Shikshan Prasarak Manadal at Basmat in 1995 whose vision was to provide quality education to students from diverse backgrounds, irrespective of region, religion, caste, economic strata and academic performance. Where only one college was there in Basmat before 1996. Which is well known for its socio cultural activity and fertile agricultural land. Around 200 villages are attached to this town for regular work however the district places like Hingoli, Nanded and Parbhani are around 35 to 60 Km away. Hence by considering this fact there was high demand from rural masses to have some good quality educational Institute and our management started Shri Yoganand Swami Arts College at Basmat in1997. This college is permanently affiliated to S.R.T.M. University, Nanded and it is included under 2(f) and 12(B) of UGC Act since 2012. This year SYS College steps into the 18th year of its existence and service to the national manes.

- To motivate the faculty and the learners to take quality initiatives in academic, research and extension activities and help them to serve as desirable human resource in the development of the nation

6.1.2. What is the role of top management, Principal, and faculty in designing and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The institution is governed by Jai Bhavani Shikshan Prasarak Manadal, Basmat in 1997. The management, the Principal and the staff are always stepping together for designing and proper application of the quality policy and plans. The principal of the college is the head of the institution and is always eager to provide requisite leadership to the system. The principal takes care to follow university circulars, bylaws, the statutes and the regulations framed from time to time. In the beginning of each academic year, a meeting of LMC is held where annual planning is done and same is being communicated to faculty. Most of the time get together organized constituting President of the management, Principal and all teaching and non teaching employees and discuss on various issues. Principal also conveys meetings of the advisory committee, Importantly the principal provides academic leadership in association with the various faculties. evolves strategies for academic growth. The faculty actively involves in decision making process. However the recommendations of the committee are submitted to the principal to enhance quality education imparted by the institution. Hence they are actively involved in the decision making process to sustain.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

The management encourages the staff participation in the process of decision making. The college has constituted different committees of teachers and members of the Non-Teaching staff which play vital role in planning and implementation of activities. The personal interaction of the Principal with various stake holders, faculty, non teaching staff, students, guardians play an important role in this. Apart from this, the information is available in student's feedback form. The information which available in self-appraisal forms of teachers help the management to plan the proper support for the policies. The Principal who is the head of the institution he bears the ultimate responsibility of both the academic and administrative for the smooth running of the college and his role is multi dimensional. He prepares the agenda for governing body meetings. Principal is responsible for executing all decisions correspondence with the governing body, S.R.T.M University Nanded, Govt. of Maharashtra, Central Govt. and UGC. He offers advice & suggestions in terms of functions. In this way principal motivates the teaching and non-teaching faculty of institution.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The Principal of the college has complete autonomy to govern the institution within the purview of the rules and regulations framed by the government. In the beginning of the academic year, a self mapping exercise is conducted for the staff by IQAC. This exercise exposes the strengths and challenges of each of the personnel to draw a potential map, which gives insight to the management, for the distribution of responsibilities. The head of the institution appoints the conveners for various committees

with the consent of the governing body, and further nominates the membersof committees. Official notice is issued along with the guidelines defining the roles and responsibilities of the committees. The committees prepare action plans and submit to the principal for approval. The committees carry out the activities and at the end of the academic year the conveners submit the reports of the work done to the head of the institution. The faculty is informed of their duties and responsibilities by the head of the institution in the scheduled staff meetings and departmental briefings. The administrative staff is given the responsibilities.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The Management of the college has an amicable rapport with the head of the institution. The members of the Management Committee meet frequently to the head of institution and they are discussed the problems and issues related to college development, administration, appointment and infrastructural needs and student disciplines. Local Management committee meeting, is constitute and some staff members. In the meetings the responsibilities are defined and communicated to the staff through the head of the institution. If the situation demands, the President of the Management Committee holds meeting with the teachers to communicate directly and bestows the responsibilities.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college recommends its faculty members every year to attend orientation and refresher programmes held by various agencies, universities and other academic institutions. It keeps them abreast of the latest information and knowledge in the concerned area and enables them to take the lead role in developing and implementing academic, cultural and sports activities. The management is always encouraging and supporting the involvement of the staff in the improvement of the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process by way of constitution of various committees such as building committee, advisory committee, discipline committee, examination committee, etc.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

At the college and departmental level, faculty play important role in the decision making .A decentralized functioning of institution empowers the quality of institution in all aspects. Faculty members participate very activity in action plan. The principal conducts regular meetings with teaching & non-teaching staff for the effective implementation. Departmental meetings are taken These decisions are reviewed by higher authorities /committees in case of needs. At the beginning of academic year various committees are being formed and each committee is being empowered to execute their action plan.

Every year faculty members are motivated to attend orientation and refresher courses which help them to acquire the latest information and knowledge which enables them to take lead roles in developing and implementing academic activities.

Staff development programmes is being organized by IQAC to promote the leadership qualities of faculty members.

Additional responsibilities are being assigned to faculty members every now and then to foster their leadership qualities.

All co-curricular and extracurricular activities organized by various committees, clubs and associations foster the leadership of both the faculty and the students.

Participation in NSS activities also help the students acquire leadership qualities.

6.2. Strategy Development and deployment

6.2.1 Does the institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, following its vision and mission statement, the college has framed a quality policy which views the learner as a dynamic being responding to the challenges that the complex and competitive world holds for them. A number of steps have been taken to translate quality to its various units by the college. IQAC monitors the activities and plans proposed by various departments for the calendar year. IQAC with regular interval of time takes feedback from every department. The governing council grants permission for the prospective plans prepared for the stake holders. Then it is placed before the teachers, student representatives and administrators for discussion. Then it finalizes and submits to the governing council for scrutiny and implementation. In the academic units teachers are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops, Short term courses, conclaves and refreshers/orientation courses to update their knowledge. The faculty has been provided all the latest communication technology for teaching/learning purpose. In short, the institution aims at giving the nation, quality human resource.

6.2.2 Does the institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

Yes, After taking feedback from various resources, administrators and faculty members sit together and discuss perspective plan for its infrastructural and academic growth. The institution has purchased 3.4 acres of land and has its own building. As far as the infrastructural growth is concerned we have adequate classrooms, auditorium and playground and library. The institution

has 200 hundred students and the present infrastructure is adequate for the present strength. We desire to provide qualitative higher education which will provide employment to students. Hence the graduates who are passing from this institution should be enabled with high potential and will be able to face the competition. In future, the institution desires to begin vocational courses or applied diploma curses introduced by UGC from time to time. It will help students to earn while they are learning. In future we also intend to begin new courses which will be more useful to students. The perspective institutional plan developed by following the procedure of involving the cooperation of teachers, students and members of the Managing Committee. In order to formulate the strategy of development and deployment, the committees are constituted for each and every developmental work. Teachers have to participate in all the institutional plans and wherever the situation demands. In the cultural committee and magazine committee students are involved along with the teachers.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The college has developed efficient internal coordinating and monitoring mechanisms. In cognizance with the educational needs and demands of the nation in general and beneficiaries of the college in particular, the goals are set through collaborative and collective efforts of various components of the institution. Thereafter, the responsibilities are assigned to individual teachers and departments. The college has a democratic set-up, where each unit is given freedom to innovate and plan its perspectives of development, yet it operates through a structured organization for disciplined and smooth functioning. The line of hierarchy is maintained and the code of conduct is implemented to bring harmony and unity in its various cells. Our parent institution Jai Bhavani Shikshan Prasarak Manadal Basmat governs our college. After the selection procedure of a new employee, the president of the governing body issues appointment letters and joining and approval procedure is to be completed by the Principal of the college. The policy decisions taken by the executive council are communicated directly to the principal by written letters and its execution is done through the Principal of the college. LMC oversees the functioning of both the academic and administrative aspects of institution. LMC meets twice a year for discussion of various issues. The principal is the head of the academic and administrative departments of the college. The teaching staff takes care of curricular aspects and keeps a watch on the activities related to co-curricular and extracurricular aspects.

Teaching & Learning

The institution has framed for itself various strategies which enhance the quality improvement. These strategies are framed by the college keeping in view the quality changes required for the development of the college. The procedure adopted for admissions provided by the college is based on student's academic records. The rules and regulations set by the affiliating University and the State Government are strictly followed for students' admission. Apart from the lecture method of teaching, group discussion, field studies, debates, tutorials, seminars, study tours etc are adopted for proper understanding of the subjects. The college has well experienced faculty members. The faculty members of various departments participate actively in academic programmes. The library staff is well qualified and their services and experience is used in updating library for the optimum use by the students. The teachers are given full permission to enrich their knowledge through Seminars, Refresher Courses, Orientation Courses etc. The college follows the self-appraisal method to evaluate the performance of faculty, which is used for correcting shortfalls. The college encourages the teachers to participate in self-enriching courses whenever different institutions organize them.

Research & Development

The assessment of this criterion of institutional functioning is done by using the key aspects prescribed by NAAC i.e. the ability of the institution to promote and sustain research culture, freedom to publish results of research, extent of use of consultancy, healthy participation in extension programmes. The college is not having a recognised research centre duly approved by the affiliating university. The scope of research motivation is very little. However, the faculty is very much aware of the growing importance of the research based education. The college encourages the teachers for research work. Nine Ph.D faculties are there in college and remaining teachers of the college are engaged actively in research work and persuing Ph.D.. As far as development is concerned, The NSS officer co-ordinates various extension activities of the college. Through NSS, the students are encouraged to undertake community-oriented activities like social work, health-hygiene awareness, medical camp, blood donation, AIDS awareness, environmental awareness. Students and teachers are provided with money and time from the college for extension activities.N.S.S. and sports students participate in such activities in

coordination with N.G.Os. The college also organizes sports activities and encourages the students to participate in them.

Community Engagement

The college has two units of NSS. The college encourages students to take part in NSS and other extension activities. Comprehensive projects are undertaken by the students in collaboration with the community. The college has also established women empowerment cell. The college organizes various outreach programmes to enable the students to respond to the larger issues of society: The college organizes blood donation camp, NSS camps, student rallies on the Aids day etc. free medical check-up, youth festivals, tree plantation festival etc. The college also organizes awareness programmes on vital issues like female foeticide, drug addiction, HIV/AIDS, etc. The surveys like toilet availability at village level and the socio-economic position of laborers in Basmat city are being undertaken by the college. Awareness regarding Consumption of soyabean in daily diet in different form is conducted through trainings and workshop for open to all in town. Around 150 women attended the programmes. In collaboration with mahila mandals and Jai Kali mata cooperative bank Bank one day workshop was organized.

Human Resource Management.

There are many staff welfare schemes. The institution recruits faculty members and staff based on the guidelines provided by the affiliated University. Effective system of A.P.I. of teachers is existed. Communication system with all stake holders is very good. Human resource management is a very sensitive area where the college adheres to the principle of rigorous discipline but with warm human touch. The administration has developed mechanisms to watch each and every employee closely, at the same time it takes care to keep him/her at a comfort level, so that he/she could work efficiently to the maximum of his/her capacity.

Industry Interaction

Faculty members & students from different department organized industrial tours and visits to various industries likesugar factory, Bank, Nagar palika, Panchayat samiti fort, historical places NGO,language department of university and colleges. Department of Home Science and Geography organized tour to Marathwada Krishi Vidyapeeth Parbhani to visit the department of Metrology and Collge of Home Sience. etc. Visit was organized to Dam to get the first hand knowledge and learn a lot from these visits.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information [from feedback and personal contact etc.] is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Head of the institution, who plans, implements and monitors all the institutional programmes along with various academic & co-academic bodies, keeps in touch with the management through correspondence and presentation of reports in the management meetings. The management and head of the institution are always in interactive mode with each other. The head of institution and Local Management Committee get the feedback from teachers, students and the public with regards to the teaching quality, curriculum, extra -curricular activities and infrastructural demands. In the meeting of the Management Committee the information gathered from different sources are discussed with the participating members. After thorough discussion and deliberation the existing facilities and activities of the institution are reviewed and decisions are taken for their implementation after going through the available resources.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process?

The management is always encouraging and supporting the involvement of the staff in improvement of the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process. The management through the head of the institution involves the staff members in various activities related to the development of the college. The staff members are involved by way of constitution of various committees such as campus development and college development committee, Admission committee, advisory committee, examination committee etc.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the management council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The College Trust & Management Society keeps on working for the betterment of the institution.

The Management last year, in the meeting of the council passed the following resolutions

- 2. Resolution is passed to purchase CC TV cameras for security of students
- 3. Resolution is passed to file the proposal of Rs.2,00,000/ for funding to District Sports Officer with regard to ground leveling in college campus.
- 4. The resolved issues were implemented this year. College is preparing and submitting SSR this year. Eight CC TV cameras are purchased. The proposal of Rs.2,00,000/ for funding to District Sports Officer with regard to ground leveling in college campus is sanctioned and Received Rs.1,50,000/
- 6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes' what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy yes, the affiliating university.

The University has a provision of status of autonomy but we have not applied for status of autonomy for the institution.

Institute has constituted a grievances Redressal committee where well defined grievance redressal procedure follows. This committee discusses the matter with principal to solve the problem. It has been regular practice of the faculty and principal to meet the students in or outside the classroom to know their grievances if any. We are very happy to say that no major grievances are reported in last few sessions. Adequate representation is given to female employees on the grievance redressal cell.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the court on there.

There is no court case filed by the institute or either against the Institute.

6.2.11 Does the institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes' what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The institution has clearly set and defined mechanism of obtaining the feedback from the students to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions. Further it is used to improve the overall competency or the students. Faculty obtains the information of problems of students through various sources. Good results are achieved by the institute in both academic and administrative work. The measures are taken to solve the problems. Feedback form is being taken from the students in which students freely state the problems they face. The feedback given by the students is in turn communicated to the entire faculty members in written and directs them to improve the matters where they are lacking behind. Institution gets suggestions to improve on the weakness in all manners through this feedback method.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The management has potential map of the faculty and is able to rightly identify their individual strengths, areas of interest and accordingly assign responsibilities. It protects freedom of individuals, appreciating their innovations and thereby motivation is achieved for further work.

Responsibilities of staff are communicated to them through clearly defined role in the implementation of any given assignments.

- Every year a good number of teachers attend general orientation and refresher courses conducted by various universities for the upgradation of their skills and knowledge. The college provides duty leavefor attending such programmes.
- Principal encourages staff to undertake various research projects like of major and minor projects. Faculty members of the institute actively participate in national and international seminars and conferences.
- Computer orientation programmes are conducted for the non-teaching staff from time to time to enhance their computer skills, for the better management of their office work.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

There are relevant rules in the institution regarding the faculty empowerment. These rules pertain to attending seminars, conferences, refresher and orientation courses and other training programmes. The head of the institution recommendes the names of senior faculty to be trained for administrative positions when promotions are due. The college has sent proposals for organizing seminars, workshops, and conferences. The CAS benefits are availed by each employee who is eligible for it. At the institutional level, the College Management motivates faculty members through prompt appreciation of exceptional merit and talent and by honoring them in the annual gathering.

6.3.3. Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The achievement of faculty members are monitored and updated in the college records. performance based appraisal system is implemented as per the guidelines from SRTM University Nanded and UGC. The PBAS of faculty is submitted individually on the basis of his/her yearly achievements, discipline, quality of work etc. Besides this the assessment of the teachers comes through feedback forms from students which in turn indicate the teacher's quality and efforts. Students are expected to fill the feedback forms for all the teachers concerned with their classes. The feedback forms has a well defined set of questions that help the students to evaluate the teaching capacity based on understanding content of the lecturer and define how far the teacher

has succeeded in reaching out to the level of students. These details are accessible to staff to help them to judge their performance.

The principal understands the student reflections and he shares it collectively and individually across the staff. If there are any issues of concern, the faculty member is facilitated to overcome the lacunae without decreasing his self esteem. Wherever required, counseling is provided to staff in order to help them to improve their professional capabilities. The head of the institution also uses evaluation in an informal way to improve the service of the office staff.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The performance appraisal reports duly filled in are being assessed by the Principal and Management. The Management keeps a vigil on the professional behavior and attitude of the members of the teaching as well as the non-teaching faculty. Annual increments and placement in the grades are implemented by the managing committee and due recognition are given to the teachers who have completed their Ph.D. The management takes effective decisions which are incorporated in the proceedings of the meetings of the managing committee and Governing Body.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and nonteaching staff? What percentage of staff availed the benefits of such schemes in last four years?

The strategies adopted by the Govt. of Maharashtra for faculty welfare include career advancement benefits for those with higher qualifications such as Ph.D. as well as opportunities for those who wish to improve their qualifications. Government and affiliating university has implemented following social welfare schemes.

- 10Medical leave/year are given to the employees during his/her job period.
- There is a provision of maternity leave and paternity leave given to the staff.
- Duty leave is given, if applicable.
- An insurance policy of LIC named GSLIS is given to the staff members whose premium is automatically deducted from their salary.
- Provident fund.
- To avail the facility of loan from various banks, the institution provides all legal documents.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The college provides pay scales as per UGC rules and security of service to the faculty and other staff who have desired qualifications, knowledge and skills. Those who are employed on adhoc and contractual basis are offered better pay scales and assurance of job. They are continued in the coming sessions and wher ever possible the faculty on contractual basis is offered permanent employment. Their teaching experience prior to being recruited in this college is considered for increment in their pay. Similarly, Ph. D holders get three additional increments. Irrespective of their years of teaching experience, permission is granted for the faculty to pursue their Ph.D. as part-time researchers.

6.4 Financial management and Resource mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The financial resources of the college are managed very effectively. Proper accounts are maintained by college through cashbook, ledger and voucher file. Each and every transaction is supported by the vouchers. All the funds and fees collection are deposited in the bank. Only duly authorized Principal can operate account through the bank. All recurring and nonrecurring expenditure are incurred through cheques. Audit is done by the authorized chartered accountant every year. For efficient use of financial resources, the budget is prepared in the month of April for the next year. All financial matters are supervised by the concerned committee chaired by principal.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the measure audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The accounts of the college are subject to audit by the external qualified Chartered Accountant appointed by the College, Trust & Management Society. The institution is being aided college of the Government of Maharashtra is audited through DPI (Colleges). The DPI (Colleges) deputes its audit team every year to conduct the audit of the grants-in-aid received. College has completed the assessment up to financial year 2013-2014. However audit by done by J.Doffice, Nanded has been up to 2011-2012. The audited report by the external CA is placed before the Management in the meeting of the Trust & Management Society for whetting and rectification, if any. The qualified remarks given by the auditor are taken into consideration in the forth coming years.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipt/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and

The major sources of funding for college are as follows:

- Total fees collected from the students.
- Grants received from State Govt. for salary only.
- . Through Management

Whenever there is a need of financial assistance, the college raises demands to Management and it is fulfilled by the Management from time to timeas per justification.

Deficit Management:

The college receives 100% of the grants-in-aid from the Maharashtra Government.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The college devises various ways and means to mobilize the resources it needs for the welfare of the students. Some of the methods used by the college towards achieving these goals are given below:

- 1. The institution has organized intra university N.S.S. youth leadership camps and zonal level sports events. The expenditure for such events is partially borne by the affiliating university and partially by the institution.
- 2. The faculty of the college contributes for the 'student welfare fund' regularly which is used to help sincere and needy students.
- 3. In collaboration with S.R.T. M. University, Nanded we have organized *Mahatma PhuleLecture Series*'where we received Rs5000/ grants from the university for one Year 2013-14.

Within the existing academic and administrative system, the institution has developed mechanism of its own for the quality assurance. The quality of the institution is evaluated on the basis of academic performance of the students in their examination. The teachers also judge the student's academic abilities by oral question – answers and written tests. The poor students are helped by the teachers to improve their academic quality by taking extra classes and guidance and providing notes, additional reading material. The administrative system also looks after the quality education in the institutions. The different committees set up by the institutions work for the administrative needs. The Admission committee, Examination committee, Discipline

committee are also constituted and are always vigilant for quality assurance of the institution's administration.

The decisions taken in the IQAC meeting are communicated to the Management. The important decisions of IQAC like student feedback, organization of inter university camps, establishment of research and development cell for enhancement of research etc are approved by the Management. The IQAC has the external members on its committee. Since they are the representatives from Society, Administration and Management their experience and knowledge helps the IQAC at large. The alumni also contribute in enhancing the internal quality by making important suggestions in the alumni meet.

The institution has effective mechanism to get academic and administrative work done in the institution. The administrative checkup is maintained by the effective functioning carried out by the various committees. These mechanisms are interdependent and therefore, there is no scope for any failure in any system. The Head of the institute conduct meeting regularly and visit the class rooms to ensure proper delivery of the content and material and completion of course as per syllabus in time. The students play major role in assuring quality of education imparted by the institutie. It is through their active participation in the classroom, the quality of the education is maintained. The college is tries to make the students punctual and attend the classes regularly. They approach to the couse teachers for the problems related to their syllabus. The student participation is assured involving them in cultural and other activities. The students also approach Head of institute directly for their problems. In order to improve the functioning of academic and administrative system, the institution has internalized the best practices. The insistence on students' participation in academic matters has improved the quality of education and administration in the institution. The administration is maintained by the involvement of staff at every level. The examinations are held quite smoothly by the active participation of the staff. The teachers are supportive to the academic needs of the students by offering them reading material and extra classes.

The main task of IQAC being quality assurance, planning and monitoring the projects undertaken, it accomplishes through the following:

- Disseminating information on the various quality parameters of higher education.
- > Reviewing the existing programmes and introducing new age programmes relevant to the present educational scenario.
- Promoting research and creating an atmosphere conducive to research.
- > Promoting the use of technology for enhanced teaching learning.

- > Imparting value based education.
- > Documenting the various quality enhancing programmes / activities of the college.
- ➤ Consolidating the feed back responses from students, parents and other stake holders.
- Facilitating the academic audit committee in creating a learner centric environment conducive for quality education.

The IQAC meetings are conducted after every four months for the planning and implementation of quality enhancement measures and the decisions taken are communicated to the staff and students through in-house meetings of various committees for effective execution.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated frame work for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'Yes' give details on its operationalisation.

The institution has adopted a three tier system where the governing council is the ultimate decision making body accountable to the stakeholders. The IQAC collects inferences from the learners and various committees through participatory interactions based on which it proposes comprehensive perspective plan for approval and the supervision by the governing council (LMC) ensures the proper implementation. The fair representation of the learners ensures the transparency in the process.

The college has developed an efficient coordinating and monitoring mechanism for the effective implementation of the quality assurance procedures. First the goals are set through collaborative and collective efforts of various components of the institution. Thereafter, the responsibilities are assigned to individual teachers and departments whereit is required. Training is provided to the teaching as well as the non-teaching staff. Each department is equipped with the latest academic infrastructure and trained to use it to achieve the desired goal.

In the case of institution, the external regulatory authority is SRTM University, Nanded and college make the compliances as per their needs and requirements.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

In the beginning of every academic year, the academic calendar is being prepared. The teaching learning process and other co curricular programmes are being organized as per plan. The IQAC with assistance to other departments monitors the teaching learning process. The problems of

faculty are confronting are being sorted out in the meetings.. Faculty is empowered to determine the intended educational outcomes of their academic programmes and activities. The discussion also takes place on the university level examination results. If necessary, the faculty is being advised to improve themselves in the desired area. Faculty use the information collected to develop and improve academic programmes. The institution has a clearly defined, set mechanism to monitor the learning outcomes. Attendance is compulsorily taken by the faculty member and laboratory hours are fixed. Assignments are corrected within a short duration and the marks are entered in register, which acts as a ready reckoner for academic progress of the students. Based on the participation in the class tests, seminar and the marks scored in the assignments, the student level is judged by staff member and appropriate action is taken. Use of L.C.D projector, Tape recorder enhance the teaching learning process. At the end of each unit test, progress reports which consist of unit test results and attendance status are submitted to the office for further action. Counseling is given to slow learners. Parents of such students are called to meet their respective faculty member, if required. As the entire lab courses are continuously assessed, students who lack in these courses are given additional help and guidance. They are also given additional lab practice. The faculty members are encouraged to conduct test, quizzes etc. to monitor the academic progress of each student.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies mechanism and outcome to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The institution has evolved stakeholder's web by forming different platforms like college advisory committee, alumni association, Parent teacher meet and various committees with a fair representation of students. The IQAC in the planning process considers feedback collected from all the stake holders to prepare perspectives on development. These developmental perspectives are discussed in the respective meeting of advisory committee, Parent Teacher meetings and alumni. The reflections of the meetings are incorporated in the plan. The management has developed evaluation tools for stake holders to record their opinion, suggestions and objection for constructive developments of future.

- The office equips with computers of TFT screen to save the energy.

7.2 Innovations

Academic Innovations

As MCQ patternis being introduced to the student first time in the academic year 2010-11 and students are afraid of it. So developing question bank which helps to remove the burden as well as it also helps to improve success rate of students in the University examination.

Feedback Mechanism:

Students give the feedback about the teacher and course content at the end of session/semester. Besides informal interaction between the students and subject teacher, the principal also interact with students and give instruction and guidance. Teachers are encouraged by principal regarding various measures to improve subject understanding or teaching skills if any.

Computerization of administrative Blocks:

The college administrative block has been fully computerized. The administrative staff has been given formal training to understand the technical knowledge pertaining to working on the technology.

Computerization of Library

The college has made the library computerized. In the library, the students have been allocated a separate reading room where they can carry their own books to study.

Students meet with Principal

It has been regular practice for Principal to meet the students in the class room exclusively or informally outside classroom to get their informal feedback. The college also improves academic performance, infrastructural needs, and basic facilities.etc. This reflects the openness of our system hence quality sustenance is possible.

Installation of CCTV cameras

Our college is totally under CCTV which helps the Principal to watch each and every action of the stakeholders, staff members, visitors, and trespassers. Thus the whole college campus is under the vigilance of principal.

1. Title of the Practice:

Earn While Learn: Student Welfare Scheme

2.Goal

To provide financial support to the economically backward student who are regular and sincere during their academic period in college and for persuation of higher education

3. The context

This committee is constituted as Principal is the incharge head with other 3 faculties. Those students who are economically backward and poor, committee provided them financial assistance in terms of the examination fees and provide educational aids by which their higher education should be continued without any intruption.

4. The practice

This scheme was started in the year 2012. In this practice principlal deduct Rs.500/month and the faculties of the deduct Rs.200/ month, however non teaching staff gives Rs.100/-month for the Student Aid Fund. Through this practice we are able to provide moral and economical support to the stakeholders. The needy students approach the committee and work as per requirement after college timings. The work may be cleaning and maintainance of library, garden development. Stdent will get Rs.25/ hour and they can work per day only two hours.

5. Evidence of success

Yearly twenty five students are benifited. Students can able to pay the annual examination fees, monthly bus passes however few students are able to take admission in other classes like typing, stitching etc. Two students received Rs.2500/- and Rs.3000/- each to take admission for higher studies (P.G). The results of the scheme evident immediately as these students are very successively passed in their respective classes.

6.Problems: Many Students do not want to work hard.some students want money without doing any work.

6.Problems : students are not aware the importance of this game as it is newly included . the material required for this is costly . As college is not received any non salary grants is hence not able to provide the instruments which are costly one.

3. The context

Department of Marathi has 3 staff members and principal who hads the department is well known, famous novel writer and story writer and other faculty member is poetry writer. They have published many books. Hence to create the intrest and develop attitude among the student of creative marthi literature writing skills and correction of grammatical errors and critical review writings

4. The practice

As college is running single faculty i.e.Arts. and intrest of many students is towards either doing post graduation or doing B.Ed. These students generally opt the proffesion as teacher. Till to date around 50% of our alumni are in this profession of teaching. These skills of creative marthi literature writing, correction of grammatical errors and critical review writings is significantly related with thier profession. Now a days for proof reading of M.Phil and Ph.D thesis, books, quarterly issues of journals, the charges per page is around Rs.15 to 20/- Once the person can learn correction of grammatical errors and critical review writing he/she may earn attractive pay.

5. Evidence of success

Developed interest of creative marthi literature writing in student and two student has written poetry book and ready to publish.

6.Problems: Marathi is regional language of Maharashtra and commonly students are studying in Marathi medium till higher education ,but they are not aware that about lacking knowledge in correct writing and grammatical way of writing.

Hence by considering the needs of the society counseling has started.

4.The practice

College is having one optional subject for girls particularly as Home Science . Many students admitted every year for this course. The basic knowledge of Foods and Nutrition and Child

Development is included in syllabus. During discussion and meeting with members of mahila mandal and social reformist the thing was coming out that there is need of counseling of such subjects. As mentioned above one of the staff of this department is Ph.D in Food and Nutrition (Home Science) and Law graduate also and had good experience of research in Marathwada Agricltural university Parbhani. The needy couples and parents comes to department on Saturday.

5. Evidence of Success

Two couples those who are at the threshold of separation come to the department and after counseling and huge discussion and meetings with counselor they are staying together happily. Important thing is both the couples were highly qualified, but usually with misunderstanding and some misconception problem aries. Apart from this for Diet counseling college staff along with their family and many other parents from local basmati comes to the department for guidance. Particularly for preschool, school going children and adolescent girls. Many people had discuuion on phone regarding their problem of health and diet. Therapeutic foods are also suggested for particular diseases to many of them if needed.

6.Problems: People are not concious about health .lacking in knowledge about dietary recommendations, body mass index ideal weight etc. They are not aware of the importance of locally available foods and commonly consumed foods stuffs which are highly nutritious.

34. SWOC analysis of the department and Future plans:

(Strength- Opportunity- Challenges- Future plans)

Strength – Department of English has well qualified teaching staff. They have completed M.phil. For facilitating English language teaching, the department use modern latest technological audio visual aids, Power Point Device like LCD projector, to enhance teaching learning process. A scope for group discussion as availed by teachers so that they will enhance listening and speaking skill.

Weaknesses – Since the college is located in rural area, the students admitted in the department are from the medium of Marathi who fears to study English as one of the optional subjects. The reason behind this is that till 12th std, the subject is not being taught seriously in most of the junior colleges in the vicinity. They are not very good at basics of language and literature. Hence, they have developed inferiority complex among them that played a great hindrance in the progress of the department. This resulted in having fewer enrollments as compared to other subjects. Lack of educational environment. The progression of the girl student from UG to PG is less due to rural background and poor mentality of the parents of the region

Opportunities – We teach rural students, most of them are preparing for competitive examinations like staff selection, BSRB, MPSC, etc where the knowledge of English language is desirable. We have opportunity to improve the stakeholders' competence of English through curricular and extra-curricular activities. The department has opportunity to wipe out the fear about English language among students and develop interest so that they may not hesitate to take English as one of the optional subjects.

Challenges – Students are weak at the level of the pronunciation as well as understanding of the English language. They are not able to write, read & speak English properly. The students of this region are from the Marathi medium colleges and they have Marathi as their mother tongue. Therefore, in such circumstances to teach them to acquire the four basic skills i.e. LRWS (listening, reading, writing and speaking) is the big challenge.

Future Plans – The department is going to arrange national conferences on various topics from literature and other topics from the discipline. The department will going to organize guest lecturers from the various colleges of the neighboring university and SRTM University, Nanded. We want to collect the various movies on the world famous literary works of English and other languages, which will be helpful to our students to understand the text and its content. In future, we propose to increase the use of ICT in teaching to make the teaching learning process interesting.




